We just finished week three of the 2023 Legislative Session, and things are starting to heat up!

A number of our bills have been filed and assigned to committees. Governor Kemp gave his State of the State address, which lays out a roadmap for what we might expect to work on in the weeks leading up to Sine Die. Meanwhile, events close to home and across the country continue to shape our perspective and hone our commitment to the work ahead.

Let's dive in.



LEGISLATION AND ISSUES TO WATCH



This week **Governor Kemp gave his <u>State of the State address</u>**, in which he customarily lays out his priorities at the top of the legislative session, giving lawmakers a blueprint as we start to work on his <u>\$32.5 billion budget plan</u>, as well as tipping us off to the challenges we may face.


<u>There were several things I was excited to hear</u> the Governor note in his address, many of which he'd highlighted in the previous weeks. Among them:

- A <u>proposed \$2000 pay raise</u> for all state and university employees and public school teachers.
- A proposal to <u>fully fund **HOPE Scholarships** and grant awards</u>, increasing their coverage from 60% to **100% of in-state tuition**.
- An <u>investment in "workforce housing,"</u> particularly focused on rural housing development to accommodate the growing workforce resulting from several large economic development projects across the state.
- Proposing legislation to extend <u>Temporary Assistance for Needy</u>
 <u>Families (TANF) benefits</u> to pregnant people. At present, expectant

parents can't apply for TANF benefits until after a child is born. (That said, TANF will still only be available to those who qualify, and <u>criteria are quite stringent.</u>)

I was, however, **disappointed to note many missed opportunities to invest in Georgia's future,** particularly in light of the state's two consecutive years of record budget surpluses.

For instance, the Governor continued to **double down on his commitment to his Medicaid Waiver program** (dubbed "Pathways to Coverage"), which several projections note will **cover less than 1/10th of uninsured patients in Georgia at ~5x the cost to the state vs. the cost of full Medicaid expansion.**



Further, I was dismayed to see prioritization of half-measures that fail to fully address the issues faced by many of those we represent. Rather than one-time rebates and salary increases, I would have preferred to hear Governor Kemp address raising the state's minimum wage (which, at \$5.15/hour is tied with Wyoming for the lowest minimum wage in the nation), along with a larger pay increase for teachers and public employees at a time we are hemorrhaging these vital workers due in part to our state's refusal to pay them a living wage.

Members of the Georgia House and Senate introduced the Georgia Reproductive Freedom Act during a press conference at the Capitol on Tuesday, January 24, 2023. The elected officials were joined by a cohort of allies, including representatives from the organizations Amplify Georgia, Access Reproductive Care - Southeast, Feminist Women's Health Center, NARAL Pro-Choice Georgia, SisterSong Women of Color Reproductive Justice Collective, SPARK Reproductive Justice Now!, Women Engaged, and YWCA of Greater Atlanta.

This week also marked what would have been the **50th anniversary** *Roe v*. *Wade*, the landmark Supreme Court decision establishing a Constitutional right to abortion care. As we know, that right was obliterated this summer after the ruling on *Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization*, and here in Georgia, the passage of **HB 481** has **eliminated access to safe**, **legal abortion care after approximately 6 weeks gestation**, before many patients even know that they are pregnant.


This week, <u>Georgia House Democrats announced</u> we had filed the <u>Reproductive Freedom Act</u>, which would **repeal HB 481 and expand access to essential reproductive healthcare.** I am proud to cosponsor this bill with many of my colleagues.

I'll save you the trouble of pointing out that **Georgia has a GOP trifecta**, meaning anti-choice Republicans hold control of both legislative chambers and the governor's office. It does, however, invite the observation of how this state manages to pass such **extreme**, **restrictive legislation**—**with more possibly**

to come—through an ostensibly representative government despite such laws running counter to what a plurality of voters want.

TEAM AU BILL TRACKER

Several **pieces of legislation I've authored** are now moving through the often Byzantium legislative process of the Georgia General Assembly. I encourage people to <u>follow along with these bills and resolutions</u> as the term progresses!



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Several of my priority pieces of legislation include:

- <u>HB 44</u>: Requires **private gun sales and transfers to be subject to background checks**, which prevent felons, those convicted of domestic abuse, and people with a serious history of mental illness from easily purchasing a firearm.
- <u>HB 45</u>: Requires a **3 day waiting period for firearm purchases**, thus building in a "cooling-off" period to defuse violent acts of impulse such as mass shootings, domestic violence, and suicide.
- <u>HB 46</u>: Allows for **extended penalties for assault and battery of healthcare workers**, regardless of specialty or location within a clinical facility. At present, Georgia Code only considers assaults on healthcare

workers in the field or in the Emergency Department setting eligible for extended penalties, but particularly in the past few years with the advent of COVID, violence against healthcare workers has been escalating in all clinical settings, and this lack of protection and enforcement is contributing to a massive attrition of staff and a dangerous environment for patients.

- HR 18: Would allow for a ballot referendum to amend the Georgia Constitution and allow for an Independent Redistricting Commission to draw our electoral maps and address the issue of gerrymandering, which leads to non-representative legislatures. (To answer a common question, the reason this is a "House *Resolution*" rather than a "House *Bill*" is because it would require an amendment to the Georgia Constitution, and therefore would have to gain a 2/3rds vote of support in both the House and the Senate in order to pass.)
- HR 43: Would create a study committee to examine the healthcare costs of tobacco smoking in Georgia. This study committee is a companion piece of another piece of legislation I'm working on, which aims to raise the state tobacco tax up to the national average. (Georgia has the second lowest tobacco tax in the country.)



Our government works best when everyone participates, and I **encourage everyone to follow along with the legislation I'm sponsoring** as they move through the machinations of (hopefully) being passed into law. LEGISLATIVE AAPI CAUCUS NEWS

This week **members of Georgia's Legislative AAPI Caucus <u>put out a</u> statement** after the horrific <u>mass shooting in Monterey Park, California</u>, which took place on the eve of the Lunar New Year.

Unfortunately, this was <u>not the only mass shooting</u> this week, and not even the only one where a majority of the victims were members of the AAPI community. In what has become the familiar refrain of a uniquely American phenomenon, **it seems we don't even have time to mourn the first tragedy before learning about the next.**

We simply cannot talk about public safety and being tough on crime without discussing guns. A majority of our constituents are in favor of common sense gun safety measures like universal background checks and waiting periods for firearm purchases, and the continued inaction of those who value guns more than they value people is inexcusable.

<u>I spoke with 11 Alive News</u> on how many members of the AAPI Caucus have been trying to advance gun safety legislation at the behest of our communities for years, and such **public safety bills continue to be a priority for many of us.** (Click below to watch video)



People in this country deserve to feel safe going about their lives. They deserve to feel safe sending their kids to school, going to the supermarket, taking a walk, driving home from work. And it's not possible to talk about public safety this week without also acknowledging the pain and suffering so many of our community members feel about the **unjust**, **barbaric death of Tyre Nichols**, and the systems flourishing with little accountability that allow such incidents to happen, disproportionately affecting communities of color, especially Black Americans.

We grieve with Mr. Nichols' family and loved ones, and feel **every level of government should hear their anguish and act**—not just with words but deeds—to reform the systems and practices that enable this to happen over and over again.

In the wake of tragedy I did feel it important to represent our communities, reflect on what we've lost and what we've gained, and look towards new beginnings. And so I was honored, along with <u>Rep. Sam Park</u>, to represent Georgia's Legislative AAPI Caucus at **the first ever full-scale Lunar New Year reception at the White House.**

Here are <u>President Biden's remarks</u> at the event. I especially appreciated his **continued commitment to gun safety legislation**, particularly in <u>renewing his call for a ban on assault weapons</u>. "I did it once as a senator," he told us, "We're going to do it again."

Additionally, I appreciated him and Dr. Biden **ensuring that AAPIs could feel seen, heard, and valued in every space in American life.** To say, in the White House, in a room filled with Asian Americans, "**This is your home,**" was incredibly meaningful, and I am so grateful to the President for <u>always being an ally to Georgia's AAPI community</u>.
